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Estimate of Fees for Document Preparation

This estimate of fees is provided for informational purposes only and does not constitute a contract for the amounts suggested. For your convenience, we accept credit cards and offer no interest payment plans for those experiencing a financial hardship.

Prices for individual documents (per person), *if not interested in purchasing a comprehensive Estate Plan package:*

Will: \$250.00

General Durable Power of Attorney (for granting authority to another individual to make financial decisions on your behalf): \$150.00

Deed (for one real estate property to avoid probate at your death): \$150.00 plus recording costs

Living Will (health care document pertaining to life-sustaining support): \$50.00

Health Care Power of Attorney (for granting authority to another individual to make health care decisions on your behalf): \$50.00

Included in the above prices are the initial consultation and the signing appointment. Any additional consultations provided in person or over the telephone will be billed separately at the hourly rate indicated on your fee agreement that you will be asked to sign at your initial meeting.

*If purchasing individual documents, 50% is due at the initial appointment and 50% is due when the documents are signed.

Prices for Comprehensive Estate Plan packages:

Services for obtaining a complete Estate Plan with a Will(s) are billed by the hour. The hourly rate is indicated on the fee agreement that you will be asked to sign at your initial meeting. Fees for the Estate Plan with a Will(s) package start at \$600.00 for a single person and \$750.00 for a married couple. Comprehensive Estate Plan package services are billed as services are rendered in a four week cycle.

General Durable Power of Attorney

Living Will

Advance Medical Directive Form

Health Care Power of Attorney

Note about Wills:

After we review the information that you have provided on the Estate Analysis checklist, we may determine that the goals you have indicated cannot be met by having only a Will. In addition, in many circumstances, having a Will alone will not avoid probate and could expose your estate to unnecessary estate taxes. For those reasons, we may suggest that a Trust be prepared to meet your needs. Please note, however, that Trusts are much more time intensive; therefore, they are more costly to prepare. All Trust services are billed by the hour.
